Remember potential members may visit during this season and a potential minister may even visit, but above all a soul who might be saved for Christ may sit next to you one Sunday morning. How will you respond and will he or she experience the presence of God?

Our God gives and gives and keeps on giving. The love of Christ brought Him into the world, and His love took him out again via the cross, to help us to put right the mess we've made of life. Think about it.

One of my favourite Bible verses is 'We love God because He loved us first.' There was a time when my grandson (now 13) and I would play a wee word game. He was just a toddler and it went like this:

I'd say, "I love you William."

He'd say, "I don't love you, Nanny."

I'd say with mock tears, "I don't love you, then, William."

And he'd say, giving me a cuddle, "But I do really love you, Nanny."

And of course, I'd say, "I do love you all the time, William".

Every time I had this conversation, I'd think, 'Isn't it good that God doesn't play these games with us. He just loves us!'

Have a good Christmas season as you discover afresh the delights of God's love.





Some of you may know that on Easter Sunday this year I was baptised and at the same time—became a member of Castlehill church. As a gift my parents gave me a hymn book entitled Songs of Victory, and ever since then I have been inflicting the hymns on the choir on a near weekly—basis. This book is full of wonderful choruses that would often be associated with our friends in the Salvation Army such as "Since Jesus Came into my Heart", and "I Stand Amazed in the Presence". Christmas Day 1947

When I was young, I lived on a hill farm in the north of Scotland with my mother, father and three sisters. Margaret was the eldest, then me, then Ruth and seven years later, Gwen. We were four healthy, happy girls, but never so happy as on Christmas morning.

Toys were never given throughout the year. Although mother baked a dumpling for our birthdays, so the coming of Santa was a great event. Because we had no electricity, Father rose first and kindled the fire and lit the tilly lamp, while we ran to mother's bedroom and waited for the call from father that we could come down. Ruth walked in front, I put my arms round her waist, Margaret put her arms round me and mother joined last. We staggered down stairs together in an excited happy bundle and opened the door.

Oh! What a sight met our eyes. Candles lit up the Christmas tree, the table covered with annuals and books and, by the fireside, the six stockings, all lumpy with gifts and crackers, had spilled their wealth on to the floor.

On this particular morning a strange thing happened. There was a knock at the door and, since it was six o'clock in the morning on a little hill farm, this was very unusual. Father opened the door and in came Mr and Mrs Simpson and Jane. Jane was a dark haired, white faced, skinny child, who was in my class at school. It happened that Mr Simpson, who lived in a tied cottage on a neighbouring farm, had been evicted from their house due to a quarrel between him and the farmer .They had spent the night with their cart and horse on our bottom field in the freezing cold. Jim Simpson had been a prisoner of war for four years and found difficulty in returning to ordinary life. Very little was known in those days about post-traumatic stress and Jim had an uncertain temper and a fear of confined spaces.

"Knowing you to be a Christian gentleman, John", he said to my father, "I thought you might give us a warm at the fire"

Of course, they were made welcome and my father said, "Santa won't have visited you, Jane, you being away from home. You're in Anne's class, so why don't you help her empty her stocking."

I could not refuse because, though father was speaking to Mr Simpson, his eyes were fixed on me and his expression brooked no argument. Jane was all smiles and when all the stockings were empty, father said "Now, Jane, pick a gift from each of my girls' piles and these will be your presents." We were not pleased, but did not dare show it.

Between breakfast and lunch all of us played board games by the fire and, after Christmas dinner, Mr and Mrs Simpson returned to their cottage after father had pleaded their case with the farmer.

On the first day after the holidays, we all took a present to show to the class. Jane held up the book, "Pip" by Enid Blyton, which had been mine. "I got it from my best friend," she said and pointed to me. "I'm not her best friend," I told my mother. "She doesn't have friends. She always stands by herself at play time and she gets her hand smacked every day for not knowing her words. I don't even like her" "Well! That is a very uncharitable speech for a Christian girl", mother said. "What did Jesus say we should do?"

"Do you know what "charity "is?" chimed in my father. "It is loving kindness. Christ didn't say we should like people. He said we should love people, whether we like them or even know them."

"You can't love someone if you don't like them first," I reasoned.

"You treat them as if you like them, as if it were you standing all alone by the wall .What would you want then?"

"I'd want a friend," I said.

"Well, "said my mother. "You will be her friend. You will walk her to school and play with her in the playground. That is what your father wants. Now, be a good girl for your father"

(When your big sister is cleverer than you and your younger sister is prettier than you and the baby is clever, pretty and cute, there is not much left for the middle child but being "good" to please their father. so I was good and befriended Jane with a will)

After two years of primary school, I then went on to Aberdeen to grammar school and Jane and her family moved to a new farm in Perth.

Many years later, I was back in my home village standing at the graveside of my beloved mother, when through the rain came a slim dark haired woman, who I recognised immediately.

"Jane," I exclaimed. "You have come such a distance."

"Surely you knew I'd come" she said, "You were always my best friend"

She talked about the fun of our school days and she had even called her first child after me.

How humbling! I had never given her more than a fleeting thought.

I hope she had a better friend than I was. A friend under duress, to please my father. It is easy for those of us who belong to a big happy family to go confidently through the world, not always noticing the child standing alone by the wall.

It is good to belong to a Christian church where everyone is made welcome and filled with people who find being charitable a lot easier than I did.
