From The Manse

Dear Friends,



The past three months have been unusual for me as I am nearing the end of my time as Interim Moderator of the parish of North Carrick and by the time you read this, there will be a new minister in post – the lady who preached to their Nomination Committee at Castlehill. It has been a challenging time for the people of North Carrick most of whom have been vacant for ten out of the past eleven years and I would ask you to remember them in your prayers ahead as they embark on this new, exciting chapter in their story.

My involvement has been minimal, but I hope I have been able to provide some stability through a very difficult period for them.

As I near the end of my involvement there, I am very conscious that I am not the best of multi-taskers and I take this opportunity to apologise to you for all that has been left undone at Castlehill as a result of my attempt to support the wider church.

As we look forward into the autumn, we are gearing up for an exciting celebration of Remembrance, 80 years after the end of the Second World War, with considerable preparation already underway by most of our organisations. Can I take this opportunity to thank all those who prepared and organised our very successful VE and VJ afternoons: they were not only enjoyed greatly by those who could attend but raised a remarkable sum of money for Erskine Home.

It is one of the hallmarks of Castlehill that we are an outward looking congregation: we can have fun together but there are always spare seats for visitors on such occasions – more to follow in the next months. We have also a deep care for the suffering in our community and our world and often reach out to them with our support. We have been asked to share in doing so again for the tragic, ongoing conflict in Ukraine in advance of a Christmas which for many of the Ukrainians will be different from previous times because more of their country is being progressively destroyed. A list will appear in the magazine of items which are required and however few you can offer, they are much appreciated.

On a happy Church family note, our editor, Rachel Queen became engaged recently and we extend to Rachel and Shane every blessing for their wedding preparations and their future together.

The wider Church of Scotland picture may remain rather blurred and seem uncertain, but the longer the confusion lasts, the more convinced I become that God is preparing the future of the Church through the strength of individual congregations. It is our call to be one of those for our large community and to enjoy doing it together as we reach out to those who have not yet experienced Church. May God continue to give us the courage and the enthusiasm to be such a congregation.

This is especially significant because 2026 sees us celebrate the 70th anniversary of Castlehill as a congregation. We are already planning to make it a year to remember: many of you have already put forward suggestions of different activities which could be planned – if you have any further flashes of inspiration, it's not too late to submit them. Can I suggest that one of the best plans we can make for next year is to reach out to our community with invitation so that we can look forward to future celebrations whether alone or in union with others. There is much to remember with thanks, there can be much to look forward to with hope.

It wasn't yet a complete victory since British troops were still fighting against Japan.

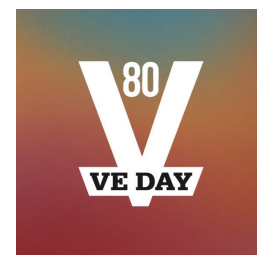

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We finished our last session on Friday 16th May when we held our annual display and awards presentation. It was well attended by families and members of our congregation.

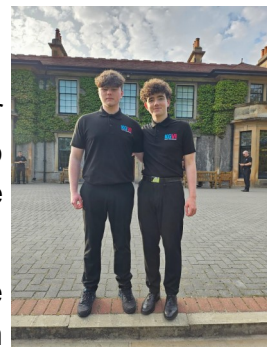


On Friday 29th August we held our annual enrolment evening. Each of our three sections welcomed new members which is encouraging.

The first big event of the session will be our dedication service on Sunday 26th October. At the dedication service we will be presenting our first King's Badges, we should be presenting 8 King's Badges and a President's Badge. It will be a very proud moment for the 17th Ayr and for me as Captain.

Following the dedication service, we will be holding our annual Soup & Sweet lunch to raise funds for the Company.

Two of the King's Men have already undertaken officer training at Carronvale, the Scottish National Training Centre. The training is one week this Summer and another week next Summer. We are very proud of the two young men who made this commitment to giving back to the 17th Ayr as leaders within the Company, thanks to Matthew Doolan and Fraser Murray.



Two other King's Men, who were not available for the Carronvale training, are undertaking officer training delivered by the local joint Ayrshire Battalion training. Caleb Black and Connor Graham will also become officers in the 17th Ayr. We are delighted to have four of our eight King's Men training to become leaders in the Company.

We have another change in the staffing of the 17th Ayr. Now that I am retired, my time commitment on Fridays will not be as it has been for the last 45 years as I take advantage of my new found freedom. Graham Watt, currently a lieutenant in the Company Section, has agreed to take on the role of Officer in Charge of the Company Section. Thanks to Graham for agreeing to fill this position.

On Thursday 5th June Margaret Graham and I were invited to the South Ayrshire Volunteer Awards in the Town Hall. This is an annual event which celebrates the work of volunteers in South Ayrshire. A vast number of organisations were represented at the awards. It was a very well organised event which paid tribute to a large number of volunteers. Margaret Graham was awarded a Lifetime Achievement Award for her near to 30 years of work in the 17th Ayr. I was awarded a Special Recognition Award for my 45 years service to the 17th Ayr. We are both very proud of our awards.



On Saturday 26th April the Junior Section visited Somerset Park. They enjoyed a tour of the stadium which included an introduction to the manager, Scott Brown. After the tour they enjoyed the last home league game of the season against Queens Park which ended in a 2-2 draw.

Next year is when we are due to return to Romania for the seventh time. As plans are formed and fund raising events are planned we will keep you informed.

Finance

This is an update on the church finances because our monthly income continues to be less than the expenditure.

Our gas and electricity supplies continue to be part of a contract the national Church of Scotland has. Over the winter months it cost £2,500/month for gas and electricity.

We recently installed new radiators in the Main Hall which will be more efficient than the previous ones. This cost £6,574.03. To date routine maintenance has cost £12,835.34.

Each congregation makes Giving to Grow contributions to the national church and this year we were due to give £62,372. This should be paid by 12 monthly payments of £5198 but I arranged to pay £2,500 each month and payments of £8093 every 3 months and so far have been able to fulfill these payments. Last year Presbytery dues were £1,289 but we have not been told yet what we have to pay this year.

As well as electricity and gas our costs for salaries, insurance for church and manse, cleaning church and halls, garden maintenance, manse council tax and the council emptying the bins have all increased. Repair and maintenance of the church, halls and manse is ongoing.

I claim Gift Aid each month and once a year claim on the Gift Aid Small Donation Scheme and the Listed Places of Worship Scheme which lets us claim back VAT charged on eligible work done on the premises. I also claim under the Scottish Government Water and Sewerage Charge Exemption Scheme each year.

We have some groups which hire our halls and they are charged monthly. Church groups, local community and charity groups are not charged for using the halls but give a donation when they can.

Money from the congregation is received by standing order, the Free Will Offering envelopes or is put in the offering plate on Sundays. Some people increase what they give each year and we hope more people would feel able to do this. We realise the current financial situation in the country and things like winter fuel allowance no longer being paid to everyone might mean some people have to give less to the church and we completely understand this. We are grateful for everything members of the congregation are able to give.

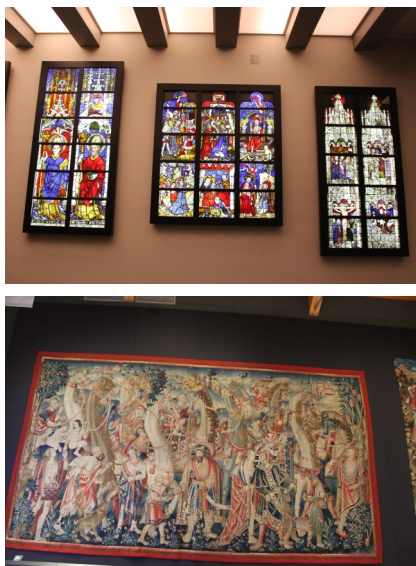
THE BURRELL COLLECTION

The Guild outing to the Burrell Collection in July was very enjoyable. The trip was extended to church members, friends and family. Nearly 40 participants enjoyed the weather which was almost perfect – not too hot nor too cold.

The Burrell Collection consists of 9,000 items collected by the shipping magnet and art collector, Sir William Burrell, who left the whole collection to the City of Glasgow Corporation in 1944 so that the public would have access to it. Although there are 9,000 items in the collection only about 6,000 are displayed at any one time. There are some permanent items with the others being rotated in and out of storage.

Our group split into three and were taken around to some of the main exhibits by three tour guides who explained the items in detail and from which part of the world they came from.

The museum was closed in 2016 for refurbishment and reopened again in 2020 in a magnificent building at a cost of £68.25 million. Well worth a visit.

A Week Spent in Iona Abbey

Probably many of you have been to the island of Iona - a day trip across Mull from Oban. Once there you probably walked uphill through the village to Iona Abbey. It's now a historic monument in the care of Historic Scotland and open to the public. Through headphones the visitor is taken on a narrative tour of the Abbey buildings, the museum and the archaeological remains in the grounds - with music and sound effects to bring past centuries to life. The key figure is Saint Columba (521-597) who travelled from Ireland with 12 companions and established a monastic prayer cell here in 563 AD. This early Christian community flourished as others joined the monks. In time an abbey was built sustained by a surrounding community which was largely self-sufficient. However brutal Viking raids and changing times spelled decline until only ruins remained. The Abbey itself was restored between 1902 and 1910. In 1938 a Church of Scotland minister, the Reverend George Macleod (who died in 1991 at the age of 96) took a group of unemployed labourers from his charge in Govan and ministers in training to work together to restore the cloisters and other monastery buildings. This was the beginning of the Iona Community - which describes itself as "an international, ecumenical Christian movement working for justice and peace, the rebuilding of community and the renewal of worship." Some current members, associates and volunteers host those who stay in the Abbey.



I was a guest there for 6 days at the end of September 2024. It was a themed creative week (many have no theme simply providing space to experience living in community - and there is an option for a 3-day stay too). This week offered opportunities to do art, make bread, write and listen to poetry, sing new songs and participate in daily worship in the Abbey at 9am and 9pm. Worship draws on several Christian traditions; is inclusive as far as possible; and concentrates on Community priorities of healing, justice and peace. Living in community involves sharing in some communal tasks for 30 minutes each day: my role was to serve tea/coffee with home-baked scones or cake during breaks in the programme. As the Abbey is an ancient monument restrictions apply and space is limited. It is not possible to have en-suite bedrooms (apart from a few allocated to people with specific needs). I was sharing a bedroom with two others in the Abbot's House. Meals are in the Refectory and are tasty, largely vegetarian and as sustainable as possible. Special diets are competently catered for.



Staff, volunteers and guests hailed from Britain, Ireland, continental Europe, parts of Africa, Australia, Canada and the USA which made for some interesting and colourful conversations! Each week someone from the Community leads a pilgrimage round places of spiritual, historical, cultural or religious interest which visitors to the island join. There's a rather demanding off-road version which I've completed previously (but my knees are past it now) and a shorter one keeping to the tarmac. Some chose to go on an optional boat trip to Staffa to view Fingal's Cave. They were rewarded with good weather and multiple sightings of seals and dolphins too. Those who chose to stay on land might have spent time in the Iona Community Welcome Centre with its extensive range of books and gifts; or visited local craft shops or tea rooms; or cosied up in the Common Room; or walked past tall Celtic crosses, small isolated farms and rocky outcrops to a pristine white-sand beach. Wherever you are the Hebridean scenery is stunning! But a warning....the WIND is strong and almost constant. Warm layered clothing is a must. So is waterproof gear - though for us it only rained heavily on one day excluding when we left on the early ferry on Friday. Some people visit Iona for a holiday or book a private retreat. Increasingly cruise ships call and their passengers crowd the village for a few hours. At night a soft quiet descends and, with minimal light pollution, the dark skies are spangled with stars.



Iona is widely acknowledged as one of the world's "thin places" where the boundary between heaven and earth, the seen and the unseen, is perceived to be fluid. You do not need to stay in the Abbey to experience something of this. However staying there inevitably brings you closer to how mediaeval Benedictine monks lived out their faith and experienced the divine. We said this blessing one day in our worship: 'The light of God to lead us. The power of God to hold us. The joy of God to heal us. The grace of God to caress us. The love of God to bless us'.

Iona

If you've never been to this island
it's time -

to risk a choppy 10-minute crossing from Mull
but it might be beautifully smooth
(and maybe you glimpsed a rainbow
over passing islands between Oban and Craignure).
The iconic outline of the Abbey grows clearer,
beyond the village,
beside Dun I the island's highest point.

It's time -
to descend the ramp onto the slipway
and set foot on Columbia's sacred isle.
