From The Manse



Dear Friends

“When is Easter?” is a common question which many ask each year because the date for Easter changes from year to year. This year, for some younger people, there will be in that question a hint of confusion, because I have school Easter services on 2nd, 3rd and 4th April but Easter Sunday is not until 20th April. Really, it is not a big issue, as from the beginning of Lent, through Holy Week to Easter Sunday we should be thinking of Easter anyway. Many like to think of EVERY SUNDAY as like a “little Easter Sunday” because the resurrection was not limited to the first Easter Sunday. Resurrection is something we experience in small and different ways if we have eyes to see it all the time.

But before we jump to Easter Sunday, let's think of some of the activities on the journey to Easter and realise that they too still speak to our twenty first century if we have ears to hear. Take the challenge Jesus had with the powers that be and think what that might mean for us in today's troubled world. This reflection looks to Jesus on the start of Holy Week and then looks now:

Welcome to the confrontational world of the activists.

Like Jesus' “My house shall be called,
the house of prayer for all the nations,
but you have made it a den of thieves.”

They stood up for righteousness, in hostile places.

Truth-tellers.

Justice-carriers.

Risk-takers.

Torch-bearers.

Fighting endlessly and fearlessly for social justice.

Standing with the oppressed,
the marginalised and the hated,
often ostracized from the rest of the world.

Paying the price for their personal quest.

Florence Nightingale:

a lone female, social reformist voice,
using statistics to reduce human suffering
and to pioneer modern nursing care.

Rev Chad Varah:

who confronted the taboo of suicide
and founded The Samaritans.

Rev Les Isaac:

who tackled the problem of antisocial behaviours
and drunkenness to set up the Street Pastors.

Mother Teresa:

who advocated for poor and homeless people, to
establish the Order of the Missionaries of Charity.

To name but a few....

Jesus confronted wrongdoings boldly,
and challenged the political
and religious system of the day.

As did many activists of past and present.

Finance

The church financial year ended on 31 December 2024. Members of the Congregational Board and Kirk Session are Trustees of our congregation.

The Annual Report and Financial Accounts, which had seventeen pages, was emailed to Trustees who could then give approval by email. Four copies of the report were signed by Ian Queen and myself and then they were passed to the Examiner for approval. A copy was sent to the Presbytery of South West Scotland for the Accounts Review Team and following approval by them a copy will go to the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR). A copy was sent to Church of Scotland headquarters in Edinburgh.

From the previous year the amount given by Standing Orders and Free Will Offering envelopes decreased and the amount given by Open Plate increased.

We were able to claim Gift Aid refunds of £13,499 and a VAT refund of £514 under the Listed Places of Worship Scheme.

Fabric expenditure during the year was £9,506 for general repairs and maintenance. Costs for heating, electricity, manse council tax, insurance and cleaning the church and halls were £30,746.

If you are a tax payer and use a standing order or FWO envelopes or the Wee Kirks to give money to the church we could claim 25% of the amount given back from HMRC if you sign a Gift Aid Declaration form. Receiving letters from family and friends was also vital for morale, keeping men and women connected to the homes they had left behind. Letters written to family and friends are today a fascinating source of information about everyday life in wartime Britain.

Do you have letters or postcards sent by your family members during the Second World War to their loved ones? This could include soldiers on the front line; men, women and children on the home front; or relatives who contributed to Britain’s war effort from Britain and Commonwealth countries.



HOPEWELLBEING LISTENING AND COUNSELLING SERVICE

“Suddenly a strong wind blew up, and the waves began to spill over into the boat, so that it was about to fill with water.....Jesus stood up and commanded the wind, ‘Be still’. The wind died down, and there was a great calm’.

In the Beginning

The HOPEWELLBEING Charity had been operating a small Counselling Service within the wider work it offered in support of the people of South Ayrshire, since its’ beginnings in 2021. We had always wanted to expand the work so when an opportunity presented itself in late 2023, a group of recent graduates from the COSCA Certificate course at Ayr College expressed an interest in using their newly-learned skills to support others; this led to a meeting that resulted in the HOPEWELLBEING Listening and Counselling Service expanding beyond the original boundaries that until then had been possible.

The Project Begins

We weren’t to know fully how the work would develop or if it would develop at all, but as an article of faith and organisation we set off on what was a year of learning and progress.....

No Problems, Only Solutions

There is a prayer attributed to Sir Francis Drake which speaks as follows :

“When thou givest to thy servants to endeavour any great matter,
Grant us to know it is not the beginning but the continuing of the same
Until the end, until it be thoroughly finished, which yieldeth the true glory”.

So a mini-disaster struck early in 2024 that set our endeavour back when the premises we used for all of our work became unusable, due to flooding and other damaging factors. What were we going to do both for the other work that HOPEWELLBEING carried on, but also for this newly-promoted and advertised venture ?

Castlehill Church

At Castlehill Church you have shown us great kindness and welcomed us into your buildings, gifting us the use of three rooms wherein we can conduct private support on a one-to-one basis to those who come to us with their struggles. It has been a profoundly moving gesture you have offered, and on an average week we provide more than twenty sessions to members of the public at Castlehill Church. We remain grateful to Alfred the church secretary, and the Minister, Paul Russell, for their continuing support of our work and it is no exaggeration to say that without your help (and that at St.Andrews) we might not have been able to sustain the work we inaugurated.

The Work Develops

During 2024 the membership of the team was broadened and so the service we were able to offer to the public has expanded. Our team during the last year and to date, brings together individuals of diverse backgrounds having a range of skills and experience : we have had volunteers with Cosca Qualifications, some with experience in offering Bereavement and Suicide support, Trainee Counsellors (ten to date with others seeking to come on board), and some fully-qualified and experienced counsellors. Due to this range of skills, experiences and qualifications that we have been able to harness, we are able to offer individuals the support that hopefully matches their need; within the group we provide Person- Centred and Integrative Counselling, Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT) and Skilled,Compassionate Listening.

Today as I write this we are now supporting members of the public in Castlehill Church, St.Andrews Church and at Maybole Health Centre. Members of South Ayrshire public are referred to us by various health workers such as GPs, Mental Health Team and Community Links Practitioners; Church groups, others and sometimes self-referrals come our way. People arrive with a variety of hurts or struggles, such as bereavement, relationship breakdowns, anxiety, stress and distress; some have carried hurts or sadness for many years. Due to the facilities you have provided us with, people can receive confidential, one -to -one support in a safe space to explore their experience

and to find sometimes a healing, sometimes the personal resources to respond to their situation. As our title suggests, in our humble way we are trying to offer the possibility that hope and wellbeing can be present. We remember the episode when Jesus calmed the storm; we in HOPEWELLBEING, and with your support, are enabled to play our small part in his footsteps, helping to calm the storms that people who come to us have encountered.

Looking to the Future

Having worked with a volunteer administrator during this last year, we were able to achieve some funding from the Health Board to allow us to employ a part-time administrator from now, which we very much appreciate. As a charity we depend largely on the money we can raise or which people contribute; we invite those who use our service to give a donation of whatever they can afford but emphasise that we do not make it a pre-requisite, and we would never turn someone away on financial grounds. The number of people seeking support continues to rise, and unfortunately we can't see everyone as quickly as we would like to; but if we are able to increase the numbers on our team with suitable volunteers then we could achieve more.

In the long run our vision is to afford our own property, tailor-made for the activities we offer in our act of service to our communities. Until then we remain indebted to Castlehill Church, and others, for the helping hand that has allowed us to continue and develop our contribution. Much of the work that congregations do is quietly given and without ostentation, but as Jesus remarks in a comment in the Gospels, 'Blessed are those who give a cup of water to these little ones'; if we have been able to play our part in that gift of love, you have helped us enable it, and for that we thank the congregation of Castlehill, for being an example of what the theologian Jurgen Moltmann called The Open Church.

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
