Our thanks are due to all our present contributors and to our previous Editor for their invaluable input.

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



Over the past year a number of jobs have been carried out on the buildings a new roof for the sanctuary being the major project.

It never rains but it pours, if you will pardon the pun, with the problems we have had with the Bell Tower and the damage that has been caused by water ingress to the interior of the building. We currently have two prices for repair and three for demolition, as all avenues are being explored. A number of Builders and Surveyors have been to look at the structure but as earlier stated little response as regards pricing the repair. The status at the moment is that a specialised engineer appointed by the Trustees of the Church Of Scotland is coming to look at it but still no word of who and when this will occur but hopefully in the near future.

On a brighter note we would like to give our many thanks to all the volunteers who have given up their time for various tasks required to be carried out in and around the church the latest project being a clearance of the cellar below the kitchen and at the side of the North Hall it has saved us a lot of much needed funds.


adults. They are really good friends and have a great fun sharing time


Castlehill is once again a church involved in training students for ministry. As we welcome a new generation of ministers in training, we look back at previous assistants and ask: Where are they now?

Anne, Paul and David and myself left Castlehill (eventually) in November 1989 and headed back to our

native North East, to the charge of Inverurie West. But we will never forget our time in Ayr for all kinds of reasons, not least the huge support we received from folks there as this young(ish) couple and kids stepped out into the unknown world of ministry. The assistantship experience at Castlehill, under the empowering Michael Dickie, has been of immense value ever since. Michael showed his assistants a tremendous amount of trust, but also infused us with what it means to be a parish minister.

So we headed to Inverurie expecting to be here for perhaps ten years or so, only to find ourselves still here after twenty years! That has something to do with the changes that have been happening all the way through that time – but more of that later.

As we settled into Manse life Anne committed herself to "being there" for the boys and supporting me as one new thing after another tumbled



Paul and David too have moved on. Paul is married to Emma and living in Johannesburg with four month old Hannah. He works as an aircraft engineer and Emma runs her hairdressing salon. David is a double glazing installer, lives much closer in Aberdeen and has a two and a half year old called Alfie.

I said earlier we are still here after twenty years because there has been lots of changes. The town itself has grown massively – at one point it was the fastest growing town in Britain. But in 2001, as we thought our way through Church Without Walls, the congregation decided to take a huge risk and redevelop our church building. So we put in a floor at gallery level and split the building in two. Upstairs we have a very attractive worship space which is also used for conferences and concerts. Downstairs, besides a chapel, a small meeting room and a counselling room we have our hospitality area which is open five days a week for coffees, teas and snacks.

We have small administration and catering staff, but the centre is served by a team of volunteers which allows those with special needs or returning to work or just looking for something to do an opportunity to serve in the community.

All this was only possible because of the enthusiasm of the congregation which is a mixture of all ages. So life has never been quiet since we left Castlehill, but we are always grateful that we made the move south and laid so many foundation stones for what was to come. Anne and I send our best wishes to you all and thank you for the invitation to let you know "where we are now!"

Girl Guiding

On 2nd July after 2½ years of fundraising, 10 adults and 11 Guides excitedly met at Castlehill Church to commence their journey by coach and ferry to Adelboden Switzerland.

After about 30 hours of travelling we arrived at the chalet we were staying at. Adelboden was everything I imagined Switzerland to be: snow capped mountains, green meadows with cows with bells round their necks and wooden chalets dotted over the landscape - all very beautiful.

When we arrived there was a thunderstorm with heavy rain but for the rest of the week we had lovely warm weather which allowed us to carry out our various activities. These included:-

DAY 1: Took a cable car up the Sillernbuhl mountain, where we walked for a bit.

DAY2: We visited the Trummelbach Falls, which were pretty amazing, throwing out 20,000 litres of water per second, we then visited Interlaken, where believe it or not the girls headed straight to "McDonalds" for lunch and then went shopping to "Claire's Accessories". We finished the day by taking the funicular railway up the Niessan Mountain with a height of 7 thousand 7 hundred feet. From the top of the mountain, you are supposed to see quite a bit of Europe and various mountains including the Eiger but after me facing my fear of heights and getting to the top, we couldn't see a thing as the cloud was so low.

DAY 3: We went to a toboggan run and the girls had an absolute ball and then we spent time in the village.

DAY 4 We went to the Woodcarver where his creations were amazing. We had a long walk back due to a diversion. We were like the "Von Trapp" family going over the hills to try to get back on track. We finished off the day at the swimming pool, which I found totally bizarre, as it was 30degree heat and we were swimming in an outdoor pool surrounded by mountains covered in snow.

DAY 5: The girls played mountain games which had been arranged, these included, tossing the horse shoe, throwing balls at cow bells to see how many could be hit, rolling cheese, milking a plastic cow and sack throwing. The rest of the day was spent shopping in Adelboden.

DAY 6: This was the highlight of our holiday, we visited Our Guide Chalet in Adelboden, where three new Leaders took their promise.

All too soon our week was up and we were ready to make the long journey home.

The girls were a great bunch and represented us well.

I would like to thank Janette Rankin for inviting me and giving me the opportunity to go in our centenary year. It was a great experience and one that I won't forget.
