

I hope to be back at church again soon.




Under any other business the president was asked to organise another outing during the summer and keep the members informed.



Parish in the glen

Some time after Christmas. Three wise men, or at least two of them were, came from the East to visit the Guild. The speaker for the evening was one of our own. Ian Macdonald,,who, in his inimitable way, reminisced of his experiences as a newly ordained minister in Strathfillan.

In a huge parish stretching 51 miles in length, situations he encountered were to stand him in good stead over his long ministry. Being appointed honourable beadle gave the responsibility for lighting the fire, so that the church was heated in time for the morning service. The manse served both as home and a base for Session Meetings and Sunday School.

We were introduced to many characters of the parish. Angus McDonald, who would greet the bride to be by piping her in at the front door of the church, running down to the organ to play her down the aisle and trebling as accordionist at the wedding reception.

Miss Carruthers, the organist, would arrive at the manse on a Saturday evening to collect the praise list. She had a permanent drip on the end of her nose. By a judicious toss of the head it, i.e. the drip, never once dropped and must have saved a fortune in non-laminating her music!

Visiting was of paramount importance, whether to Youth Fellowship, parishioners, schools or hospitals. Arriving at the home of Donald and Janet McCrae, Ian found Janet reading 'The People's Friend'. She had spent much of her time in psychiatric hospitals, so this was the church coming to them – long before the term Church without Walls, had been coined. Donald, who worked at Gorton Station, was both stationmaster and signalman. He was paid £1 per week by the Post Office for delivering letters to himself, because of the remote location. The signal box usually had a roaring fire." the fire is needing coal" Donald would call to his daughter, Alma. Equal opportunities had never been heard of in those days.

Patients met in hospital, included Angus ,a Harris man. "Will you cut my toenails?" he inquired of Ian. Angus had been brought up in the Gaelic. The few English words he had were rather rude (No examples were given!). Billy, another patient, requested Ian to sit on the end of his bed and to look up and down the ward. "So that I can have a fag". By the next visit to the ward, Billy had sadly passed away.

At Strathfillan a wee man came into Church. "You must help me. I'm destitute. I'm the man with the prams." The first pram held clothes, the second pram cooking utensils and the third pram spare parts for the first two prams. "I've nowhere to go and plenty of time to get there."

All too soon the evening was over with the audience roaring for more (Well not quite, as Guild members don't do that sort of thing!) A return visit would be most welcome. Thank you, Ian, for a wonderful trip down memory lane.

~ A Fair Trade Recipe ~

Banana choc chip Mufffins Makes 7-8

100g plain flour

40g cornflour

1 teaspoon baking powder

1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

90g unrefined (golden) Fairtrade sugar

40g melted butter

1 egg, beaten

2 ripe Fairtrade bananas, well mashed

80ml buttermilk

50g Fairtrade milk chocolate, chopped into small chunks

Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F/gas mark 6. Sieve flour, cornmeal, baking powder and bicarbonate of soda together into a large bowl. Stir in sugar. In a separate bowl, mix together the butter, egg, bananas and buttermilk. Add wet ingredients to dry and mix gently (do not over-mix). Fold in the chocolate chips. Fill a muffin tin (ideally lined with muffin cases) to just under the rim. Bake for about 30 minutes until golden-brown and firm to the touch. Allow to cool in the tin.

Read the Psalm through slowly a couple of times. Let your mind linger on any phrases that leap out at you. Get the drift of what the Psalmist is saying Take a section at a time and ponder the following points

Verses 1-6

God speaks in nature; it is his handiwork What do you like best in the natural world? Why?

Ask yourself "What does this part of nature tell me about God? Does it have something to say about his character?"

Verses 7-11

God speaks in his Word; it is his voice
What rich language is used to describe God's Word!
He speaks to us at every level of our being
"revive" (v7) ~ spiritual impact
"make wise" (v7) ~ intellectual enlightenment
"bring joy" (v8) ~ emotional effort
"give light" (v8) ~ moral guidance
Are you eager to listen to God and know the impact of his word deep within you

Verses 12-14

God speaks in Jesus Christ, his Son who is the rescuer.

The Psalm ends with the writer very conscious of his sin and his need to be free from guilt so he will be pleasing to God. We know this is only possible through Jesus Christ and the writer captured his hope in God for rescue with his last word - "redeemer".

Lord, thank you for being the God who speaks. Help me to eagerly listen to you and allow you to impact my life.
