Psalm 121 ~ Creator and Companion

We cannot think of Nepal – or Scotland – without thought of mountains. Many Psalms use mountain imagery. This Psalm emphasises the care and protection of God and encourages his people to trust him with everything. Pray that God will speak to you through it. Read the words through a few times to let them grip your heart and mind.

Verses 1-2

What do you think or feel when you look at mountains? Are you overwhelmed by their beauty? Awed by their size? Fearful of their power to bring harm? The first singers of the song, pilgrims heading for Jerusalem to worship, may have had a mix of fear (the hills hide bandits) and hope (as they looked to Mount Zion, their destination). What a real statement of God's power, whatever the image the mountains conjured! What does it mean to you that the one who made the mountains is the one who helps us?

Verses 3-4

We never know what might trip us up during any day or any week. Are you able to be as confident as the Psalmist that God will take care of you that his attention never wavers because he doesn't grow sleepy? Pray that you'll know his care personally today.


Verses 5-6

We are being protected! Neither the things we know about (the day) nor those things that take us by surprise (the night), will harm us. We have a companion on life's journey: God himself!

Verses 7-8

How conscious are you of God's care for you personally? In the busyness of your life do you recognise God's eternal 'watch'? Can you rejoice today in the creator being your companion?

R A Jewish man was travelling from Jerusalem to Jericho, and he was attacked by bandits. They stripped him of his clothes and money, then left him half dead beside the road.






A Jewish priest came along, but when he saw the man lying there he crossed the road and passed him by.






A temple assistant walked over and saw him lying there, but he, too, crossed to the other side.




