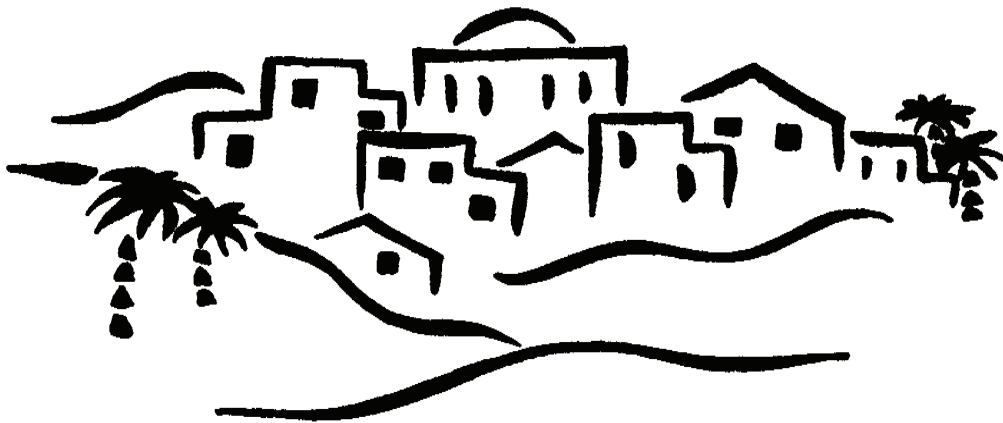

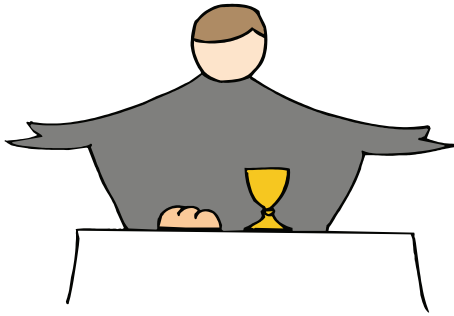

All in all a successful year; and a fitting and enjoyable celebration of how Castlehill has served our community for the past 50 years.

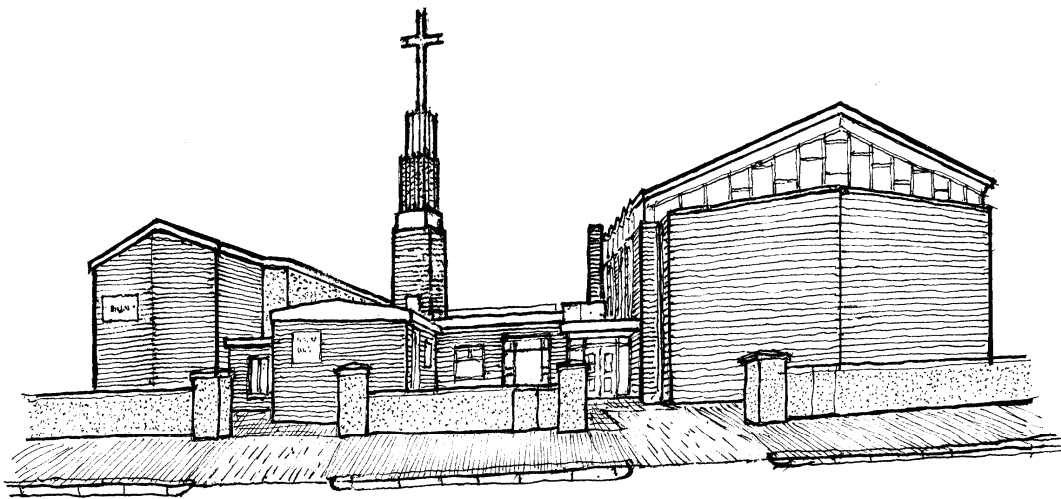

We have a hand bell group in the church.

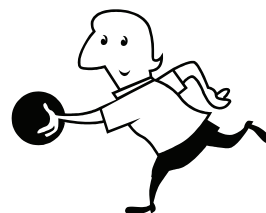
We are a cheery bunch who enjoy making music

Finance Report

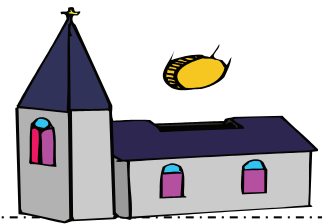
Another financial year is drawing to a close and I am pleased to report that things are looking much healthier than they were before our Money Matters campaign.

You may recall that before the campaign we were predicting a deficit for 2005 of £10,500. Thanks to the campaign that was reduced to under £5,000 and our total offerings (including gift aid) for 2005 were £83,000.

I am delighted to report that our total offerings to 31st October 2006 are £74,000. I therefore expect our full year offerings to be around £95,000, an increase of £12,000 over 2005.

Thank you to everyone who has helped us achieve this.

Have you noticed the army of unknown people God has working for him?

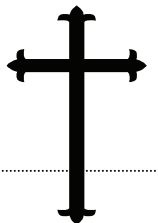
Just who was the boy with the loaves and fishes?

Letter from David Munro to Mari & Peter re 50th Birthday visit

It was a real joy for Jessie and me to be down at Castlehill last Sunday, to meet you both again and to see all the excellent developments that you have done there. The memories came flooding in as we saw and as we met old members who had survived across the years from our time. In particular, the Church was looking lovely and the new hall of fellowship with its corridor linking the old hall with it was quite inspirational and must have made a real difference in the use of all the buildings.

But for all that, the real joy was the warmth of the welcome you both gave us – we appreciated that so much. And of course it was echoed in the way the whole congregation received us. The gathering after the service gave us an opportunity to meet and chat with the congregation, while the lunch party was most enjoyable and rounded off a wonderful occasion.

Of course the memories came flooding in, from the early days in the Barn as the congregation began to grow, spurred on by a parish visitation we carried out just before the first Easter – 1957. So many memories come back of these days – the Sunday School, the Guild, the crowded services and the social activities – but one that will always be lasting for me was the occasion on the Thursday of Holy Week that first Easter when I baptized seventeen adults at a special service. The seventeen included an old lady of 82!

Then it was up to the Hall Church where it was suggested that the Chancel Cross should be covered up during the week and I insisted that this did not happen as there should be nothing going on in the hall throughout the week of which we should be ashamed to let the Cross see! For a time I had the record for the re-setting of the chairs for the Sunday morning – this was done when the Badminton Club was finished for the Saturday evening- but I was soon beaten in that regard!

And many other stories could be told of the building of the old North Hall and finally the Church, but I will not bore you with these!

It was a real joy to us both to be back, and we are so grateful to you for making sure that it was such a wonderful day for the ‘old man’

The Peace of Christ be with you all.

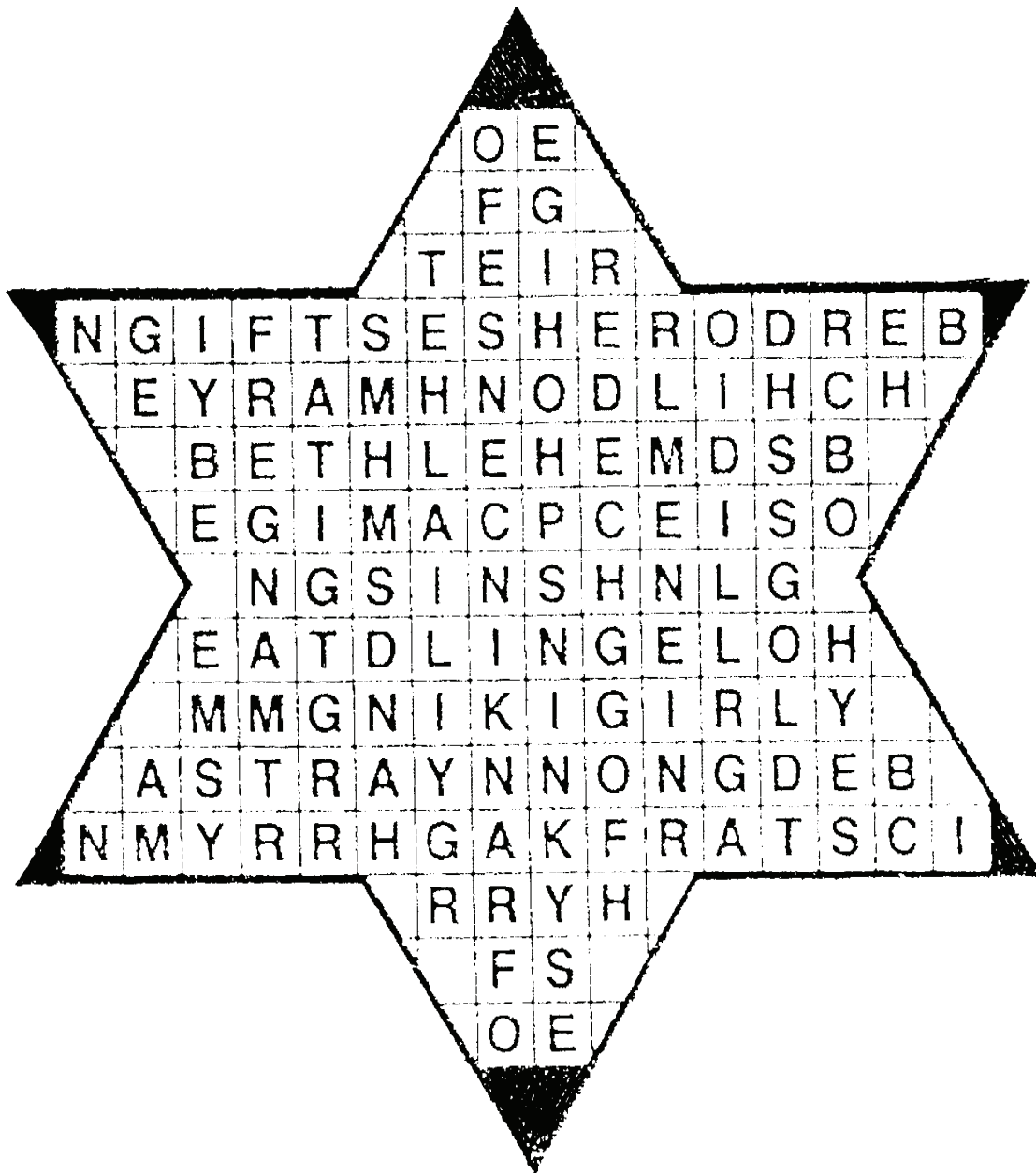

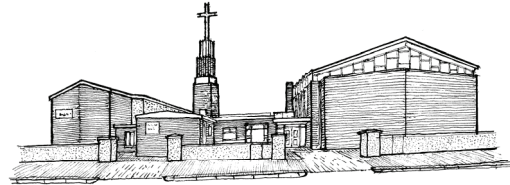

The Silver Alms Plate

A few years after Margaret and I joined Castlehill Church we noticed the Silver Alms Plate in the vestibule. I was intrigued to see that the writing on the Plate showed the wording “Associate Congr. Whithorn 1795”. Since we are both from Whithorn I inquired if anyone could tell me anything about it and how it had come to the Church.

Having asked a few of the older members of the Church and Session without any positive results, the Plate remained only at the back of my mind.

During the 2005 Stewardship Campaign when we were searching through the history of the Church for our displays I came across some interesting facts about the Plate. My thanks are due entirely to Christopher Hardie who had researched the Church History a few years ago for his Boys Brigade Queens Badge.

So how did we come to have this silver Plate in our Church? When our Church was in the process of being formed, St. Ninians Parish Church in Whithorn entered into partnership with the new Church. The decision to do this was made in 1956 and at that time both Margaret and I were members of the Church in Whithorn. I cannot truthfully say that any of this can be brought back to our memories, it may well have been a Session matter not brought to the attention of the members of the Congregation or perhaps Castlehill was not a name that had any significance for us at that time.

By 1962 we had left Whithorn but at the annual business meeting and congregational social of the Church in that year the Alms Plate was presented to Mr Munro and three elders of Castlehill, Mr Jim Girvan, Mr Bob Dunlop and Mr Willie McClements with the good wishes of Whithorn Parish Church. The Plate itself belonged to the United Presbyterian Church, which was formed in Whithorn in 1795. The first minister was a Mr John Smith from Auchinleck, a further Ayrshire connection. The United Church in Whithorn was joined with St Ninians Priory Church during the early forties and the building lay unused for many years. When it was eventually converted into a garage the Alms Plate was found and passed to Whithorn Priory Church. Both Margaret and I passed the old Church building almost every day for many years and never realised the plate lying in there would be discovered by us when we joined Castlehill Church. It serves as a reminder of the Church where we joined as first communicants, were married in 1958 and where we now find ourselves.

This type of Alms Plate was to be found at the entrance to the Church to receive the givings of the Congregation and preceded the present method of passing the plate along the pews. A photograph of the Plate can be found on the opposite page, but it is available to be seen within the Church itself, though not always on every occasion in the Church entrance.

Dear Constituent,

Accident and Emergency Services in Ayrshire

Last week I accompanied a delegation of local community representatives from Carrick, Cumnock and Doon Valley to a meeting with the Health Minister Andy Kerr.

The Health Minister will shortly consider all of the reports before making a decision.

People have made it clear to me that they are not in principle against changes which will bring improvements to health services. The meeting allowed community representatives to make clear particular issues which are concerning local people.

Andy Kerr gave us an absolute assurance that no steps would be taken to change facilities at the A&E at Ayr Hospital until the proposed Community Casualty facilities across Ayrshire are up and running. He also said that the necessary investment in paramedic and ambulance services would need to be in place and the transport concerns facing residents in Carrick and the Doon Valley would have to be resolved.

I will continue to ensure that the views of my constituents are represented to the Health Minister. I hope this has been helpful and I will continue to keep you informed regarding this issue.

Sing a new song ~ Article from "Our daily bread"

Two passages in Luke related to the birth of Jesus are often called "songs" because of their similarity to Hebrew Psalms of the Old Testament. The early church set them to music and used them in worship. One of them, the Magnificat of Mary (1:46-55), is well known. But the second "song" is a less familiar poem of praise, which was spoken by Zacharias, the father of John the Baptist (vv.67-79).

After 9 months of divinely imposed silence, Zacharias was finally able to speak. He announced that the miracle baby born to him and Elizabeth would be named John. Then, filled with the Holy Spirit, Zacharias spoke of God's faithfulness and the salvation He would bring through the Messiah.

Zacharias said Jesus, "through the tender mercy of our God, with which the Dayspring from on high has visited us," would come "to give light to those who sit in darkness and the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace" (vv78-79).

For a fresh look at the birth of Jesus this Christmas, consider Zacharias' words of prophecy and exultation. Read them aloud. Ponder their meaning. Let God use them to write a new song of praise deep in your heart.

*This Christmas sing a new song
That comes from deep within;
A song that honours Christ the Lord,
Who saves us from our sin*

There are 30 books of the Bible in this article. Can you find them?

Remember, there is no need for a mad exodus, there really are 30 books of the Bible lurking somewhere in this article waiting to be found.
