The cover photograph on our magazine this time is The Tower of St. John. It is the remaining part of the original Parish Church in Ayr. The Tower was added sometime in the 14th century. Robert the Bruce convened the Scottish Parliament in the Church in 1315. Only the Tower remains and was a landmark for seamen for centuries.

Where I live, every day I see the massive walls of the fort built by Cromwell in 1654 which engulfed the Parish Church with its Tower. I have never been sure whether walls were built to keep people in or to keep them out, whichever one it is they proved to be barriers. Through the last few years we have heard much of the "Church without Walls". I am sure we can replace "walls" with the word "barriers".

We create so many barriers of our own, prejudice, intolerance and there is a list that goes on. Even the Church itself is not immune to erecting barriers, not deliberately but sometimes by default. We all must play a part in bringing down these barriers wherever we come across them whether they be the ones we create ourselves, or others we meet in our daily lives. The Bible presents its Message to all, without any barriers. Let us pass on that Message and be a landmark, like the Tower, for all to see.

From the Interim Moderator....

Dear Friends.

Paul writes in his letter to the Church in Rome, 'Tribulation produces perseverance; and perseverance, character; and character, hope.' (Romans 5:3-4)

One of my earliest childhood memories was watching snails in our back garden flower beds. I was fascinated by this little creature with a shell; a slimy little tummy and tiny eyes that turned like periscopes. But what really seemed unusual was how slowly a snail travels. How slow does a snail go? One study clocked a snail at 0.00758 miles per hour – or 40 feet in one hour. No wonder we use the phrase moving at a snails pace to mean 'slow'.

Although a snail does move at a "sluggish" pace, one virtue it does possess is perseverance. The great 19th Century preacher Charles Spurgeon wryly observed, 'by perseverance the snail reached the ark'.

According to the apostle Paul, perseverance is key component in character development. He explained that 'tribulation produces perseverance' (Romans 5:3). And upon that building block go character and hope (v4). The original Greek word translated "perseverance" means "steadfastness, constancy and endurance". It was used of believers who endured in their walk of faith despite many painful trials.

Have setbacks slowed you down to a snail's pace? Be encouraged. God doesn't ask for a fast finish. He expects persevering progress. Have faith. Trust in God. Travel with Him and let Him dictate where we go and at what rate.

When trials intrude to slow down your life,

It would be easy for you to give in;

But by perseverance you'll overcome strife,

So just keep on plodding – with Christ you can win.

This included £21,960 for two new heating boilers and £6,850 for redecorating the Main Hall. Hello again,



I looked in to the origins of this particular proverb about the bad penny and discovered that it has been in our spoken language since coins were introduced – it always seems impossible to get rid of worthless (counterfeit) coins – they just keep circulating. It has gradually come to be used to refer to a person who is unwanted but keeps appearing... (sad state of affairs really, if you stop and think about it.)



Thankfully we have a God who always welcomes us – his love is eternal. In his wisdom he has given us a wonderful symbol of that love in the cross of Christ. Don't we all love the blue cross of Castlehill Church which is home to us, and where we often draw near to God. It is a symbol that encourages us to worship, wherever we might see it in the world.

I thought I would just take a bit of space in this magazine to remind us of the way in which God has planted this symbol of the cross in so many essential and unexpected places. You will recall our exploration of Psalm 139, during which we discovered that medical science has found the symbol of the cross in the molecules of Laminin which hold our DNA together.



Then Interstellar Space researchers using the Hubble Telescope found the symbol of the cross away out in one of the black holes of the galaxy. Well, I firmly believe that God is continuing to show himself to a world where many are still sceptical. Many and varied are the ways in which our wonderful Creator God continues to demonstrate the love of Christ on the cross to redeem a fallen world. You may recall an item in the magazine of Autumn 2013, when, under the heading of "Where are they now" we had an article submitted by one of our past assistant ministers, Elizbeth Henderson.

In the June issue of Life and Work there is an interesting item about Elizabeth. In our magazine she casually understated her work with establishing a children's bereavement charity, Richmond's Hope. In recognition of being a co-founder, she has been appointed as a Chaplin to Her Majesty the Queen and will formally join her Majesty's Household as Chaplin-in-Ordinary.

Liz helped to set up the Richmond's Hope Charity in 2003 to provide bereavement support for local children. It was the first of its kind in Scotland specialising in children's grief and now has four centres in Edinburgh, Midlothian and one in Glasgow. Over 3500 children have been helped since the charity began.

We can be proud of her achievement and her place in Castlehill Church.

Although I retired from Castlehill in 1993 - 25 years ago, just one year less than my 26 years with you all! - I not only have happy memories of so many real friends but I enjoy visits, from and to, quite a number of you, and the phone calls.

At my family 90th birthday party (15 people) I told stories about Mamie, Elspeth and Jane in both the Manse and the Church.

Like most folk I have had my share of physical and emotional difficulties but I have been richly blessed by God in my family and Church life. The great thing about my friends at Castlehill was that they not only showed their affection for me but were not afraid to offer constructive criticism of my views and behaviour when necessary. That meant a great deal to me.

Since leaving Castlehill I have been Locum at 2 parishes in Perthshire and then since coming back, Locum at New Cumnock and then Coylton and Drongan. (A year in each place). Two years ago I stopped conducting morning services and graveside funerals.

Last year I retired from organising Presbytery Healing Conferences (which I had done for 31 years!); so the only thing I do now are the monthly Healing Services (For how long?!)

I also retired this year from being Chairman of Cumnor Hall Friends Group. However, I am still given a "purpose" in life as quite a few folk come for counselling.

Having been Chaplain at 5 schools in Castlehill for 26 years I am often spoken to in the street, and when I am a patient in hospital, because so many former pupils recognise me. I have even been asked, a month ago, to conduct a wedding in November of a former pupil at Forehill who knew me as Chaplain and enjoyed worship in our Church!!

Thank you for having let me be your minister. I pray that you will soon be able to call someone and give Christine a well-deserved rest.





Tape/ Sound System/ PowerPoint

The sound system works in conjunction with PowerPoint and is run by Michael Hardie, Robert Forrester, Margaret Gerrard and Ruairi Wallace who control the sound level of the services. In particular, the Loop System is invaluable to those with hearing difficulties.

PowerPoint presentations run on the five screens in the church. Margaret Devlin, Ruairi Wallace, Christine Prout, Carol Thomson and Sandra Wyllie all contribute to the input and the smooth running of the system.

Apart from Sundays, the system is also available for funerals in the church or if one of the local schools has a special service.

Cradle Roll

When a child is baptised in the church, the name is entered onto the cradle roll which has been looked after over the years by Mary Tindall, Karen Kerr and Carol Thomson. After baptism, all children receive a copy of the Bible, a Baptismal Certificate, a Cradle Roll Certificate and a small bunch of flowers.

Are you aware that every child baptised in the church receives a birthday card from the age of 1 - 5 years? This undertaking has been carried out over several years with the help of Etta Russell, Karen Kerr and now, Margaret Cairns who buys, writes and sends the cards to the child showing that he/she is loved by the congregation and is always welcome in the church. Hopefully, as the child grows he/she will make the decision to come to church of his/her own accord.

Castlehill Church of Scotland Guild



Carravaca De La Cruz



You may wonder why a photograph of a Spanish Church features in our magazine – read on

Memorable visit to Caravaca de la Cruz.

Caravaca de la Cruz (Caravaca of the Cross) is a city in the Murcia province of south east Spain. It is a pilgrimage site and is home to the Basilica shrine of the Vera Cruz with its distinctive Caravaca cross and baroque facade.

Legend has it that a priest named Gine's Pere'z Chirinos required a cross for the alta celebrate Holy Mass. As he looked towards the windows he saw two angels appear from heaven carrying a cross. In the year 1998 Pope John Paul 11 granted Caravaca de la Cruz to be named as one of the Holy Cities along with Santiago de Composted, Santa Toribio de Liebana,.

Rome and Jerusalem.

The Cross is kept in a secure case in a small alcove in the Basillica. Many believe that the Cross delivered by the angels contained fragments from the true cross. The fragments were placed inside a cross made of gold.

Visitors are given a card showing a replica of the Cross shown here.

Numerous fiestas are held each year during the month of May in celebration of the Cross. Every seven years the Cross is carried in a procession from the Basilica down the hill to the Mother church.

It was in May 2010 I was on holiday with my sister staying with my brother who had a holiday home on the Costa Blanca. One day he asked if we would like to visit Caravaca de la Cruz. When we arrived there, we made our way up the steep hill to the Basilica hoping to view the gold cross. Once inside we were told we would have to make our way back down the hill to the Mother Church at 4 o'clock. We arrived at the church only to find crowds and crowds of people queuing up at the church doors. The procession began with the Archbishop carrying in the gold cross. Mass was celebrated and communion served then the congregation were invited to come forward to the altar and kiss the Cross, a very moving service.

My sister had a very painful cold sore that day and didn't want to go forward but she was persuaded and she did.Now did she still have that cold sore the next day????????

To be there on that day in that month in that year was just wonderful and one that I shall never forget.

At our display in May we had a slightly poignant evening when we invited one of our founding officers to be our guest of honour. **John Martin** was one of four officers who founded the 17th Ayr back in 1959. At the end of last year, he was diagnosed with terminal brain cancer, an illness he bore with great dignity. John was an officer in the company all the way through my time as a boy. My best memories I have of John are the summer camps we spent together. He, along with the other officers of the 17th Ayr became a very big influence in my life. John was a fantastic character whose talent lay in gymnastics. He coached the 17th Ayr gymnastic team to many victories in the Battalion gymnastic competition. One of his many BB highlights was carrying the colours into the church in 1969 for the first time when they were dedicated by Michael Dickie. I invited him to relive that in 2009 at our 50th celebrations.

Within three weeks of our display John had passed away. His memory will always be a part of the 17th Ayr Boys' Brigade, an inspirational figure who touched the life of many.



The role of inspirational figure is usually associated with the adults in life. However, we have a young man in our BB company who is an inspiration to young and old. Gavin Drysdale has got many qualities, qualities I could list here. His achievements become greater with each year which goes past. Gavin participates in a sport called race running which is a sport specifically for people with cerebral palsy. Gavin has participated in this for a number of years.
