### From the Interim Moderator

Dear Friends,

As Advent approaches individuals and families will be making, if not already completed, plans for the Christmas season; food and drinks for meals and parties, tickets for events such as pantomimes, travel arrangements to join family and friends, presents for our loved ones and all other aspects of the season which are important. Does Church enter into your plans I wonder?

The Christmas story, regarded simply as a story, has many intrinsic attractions and has in St Luke an admirable narrator. The romantic tale of the infant born in humble and sordid circumstances, who is in fact of royal lineage and destined to greatness, in various forms, has fascinated people from the time when story-telling began.

Here, the pastoral setting and the supernatural hunts of the real nature of the baby and his future glory enhance the story's appeal.

Just as a story it is better than Cinderella. Still keeping to the level of the art of the story teller, we may note, however, that in one respect it differs from most stories of the Cinderella kind – it is incomplete; it needs a sequel, it points beyond itself to the Good Friday story and the Easter story; it arouses our curiosity to ask what happened to the baby whose birth is described so remarkably, and what was his life.

But, of course, if we remain on the level of romantic fiction we miss the whole point. The story is presented to us not only as true, but as deeply significant.

Without looking further than indisputable facts, it is evident that the birth story of Christ is totally different from all other stories; it has really no significant resemblance to tales like Cinderella. It is a story which shook the world, and, because it was widely told and believed, the course of history was changed. To understand it at any deeper level we must look for its meaning.

Why not include Church in your Christmas plans so that you can catch the first act of the Jesus story and can then travel with him and us through the year to hear of the wonderful acts and teaching that characterised Jesus life. A teaching, which, when believed, can transform lives and provide promise and hope for those who receive the wonderful Christmas gift, offered freely to all, the Christ child given freely and in love to all – especially YOU.

Have a blessed Christmas and a joyous New Year.




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clues and directions to find a culprit and a weapon. The boys loved it.



# Let's get crafty

A Christingle is a symbolic object used in the advent services of many Christian denominations. It has its origins in the Moravian Church.

At Christmas 1747, Germany, Bishop Johannes de Watteville thought about how he could explain the love of Jesus to everyone, and what Christmas really meant to the children in the church. He decided to make a simple symbol to express the message of Christmas in a fresh and lively way. Pastor Johannes de Watteville gave each child a lighted candle wrapped in a red ribbon, with a prayer that said 'Lord Jesus, kindle a flame in these dear children's hearts". This was the first Christingle Service.

#### Make a Christingle?

Adult supervision needed; wash hands before handling the sweets and fruit.

You will need: An orange; red ribbon; cocktail sticks; foil; candle; dried fruit or sweets.

Fasten ribbon or tape around the middle of the orange. Cut a small cross in the top of the orange and lay a square of silver foil over it. Place a candle on top of the foil and wedge it firmly into the orange (the foil should catch the hot wax as it drips).Load 4 cocktail sticks with a mixture of sweets and/or fruit and insert around the base of the candle.

#### THE ORANGE represents the world.

THE RED RIBBON indicates God's love wrapped around the world and the blood Christ shed on the cross.

THE DRIED FRUIT AND SWEETS are symbols of God's creations. For many people, they also represent the four seasons.

THE LIT CANDLE symbolises Jesus, the light of the world, who brings hope to people living in darkness.



# Let's get crafty

This snowflake is so easy to make. The children will have fun selecting what colour they want theirs to be. They'll decorate your tree and/or window


You will need: 2 silver pipe cleaners 3 blue pipe cleaners

Cut the 2 silver pipe cleaners in half. Put 1 piece aside so you have 3. Twist these 3 pieces together in the centre so that you have a shape with 6 points (look at the photo for help with this).

Cut the blue pipe cleaners in half and then in half again. You will have 12 pieces. Twist these onto the silver base to decorate your snowflake.

If you want to hang your snowflake, take the piece of silver pipe cleaner you put aside, fold in half and twist the ends to one of the snowflake points to make a loop.

# Let's make a prayer chain

- 1 Take a long strip of paper and fold it six times to make seven sections.
- 2 On the top section draw the shape of a person, making sure that the hands and feet touch the edge.
- 3 Cut through all the layers to make a chain of people. (Don't cut the folds or the people will not be joined together!)
- 4 On each person write a day of the week and someone you would like to pray for.
- 5 Hang up your prayer chain near your bed. When you get up or when you go to bed, pray for that day's person.



## Financial Update

Our financial year runs from 1<sup>st</sup> January to 31<sup>st</sup> December and we currently have a deficit which means our expenditure is more than our income.

Each year we have to make a Ministries & Mission contribution to Church of Scotland headquarters and for 2017 this was assessed as £61,515. We received a reduction of £10,920 because we have a vacancy for a minister which meant a payment of £50,595 but we also pay the salary and travel expenses of our locum. The Presbytery of Ayr levies an amount for Presbytery Dues and Property Levy and this was £1729.

The cost of insuring the church buildings and the manse was £2344.30 and to date heating and lighting the church, manse and halls has cost £6319. Maintenance and repair of the buildings cost £9484.99 to the end of October and further work has been identified and needs to be done.

The Annual Fabric Appeal raised £3580 and we received £817.50 in Gift Aid claims.

If you are a tax payer and make offerings by standing order or the Free Will Envelopes we could claim back the amount of tax you paid via the Gift Aid Scheme. We can claim 25 pence for every £1 you donate and we received £8444.33 to end of October from HMRC in claims under the scheme. There are Gift Aid Declaration forms in the vestibule and they are also available from the office or on the church website <a href="www.castlehillchurch.org">www.castlehillchurch.org</a> under the Publications heading. Completed forms can be returned via the office or given to Margaret Devlin.


